PROVINCIAL NEWS IN BRIEF

LEINSTER.

109 Years Old.—Amongst the inmates transferred from New Ross Workhouse is a woman 109 years of age.

Change of Treasurer.—Ardee Town Commissioners unanimously decided to transfer their account from the Ulster to the Hibernian Bank.

Rails Torn Up.—Owing to the rails having been removed on the D. and S.E. Railway at Rathdrum yesterday morning, the Wexford to Dublin train was considerably overdue.

Heavy Claims.—Claims amounting to 29,630 have been lodged with Ardee Rural Council on behalf of the Great Northern Railway and Northern firms for the destruction of goods in transit.

Doctor's Pension Increased.—Dundalk Guardians unanimously increased the superannuation allowance of Dr. Blake, former medical officer for Ravensdale, from £130 to £200 a year. It was stated that during his long service there had never been a complaint against the doctor.

Milk Contracts.—Messrs. R. Wilson and J. Short have been accepted for the milk supplies to the County Home, Rathdrum, at 1/2 per gal.; and Mr. P. O'Brien, Wicklow, for the County Hospital, Wicklow, at 1/4 per gal. Meanwhile milk is being sold in Wicklow to private consumers at 6d and 7d per quart.

Housing Rate.—The Provisional Government wrote to Ardee Town Commissioners stating that the special rate for housing could only be assessed on one-fourth the annual value of land, and on the full annual value of buildings, and approving of the levying of a rate not exceeding 2/- in the £ for housing purposes.

Surcharges.—The Dail Auditor, Mr. Bernard reporting on two years' accounts to Wicklow U.D.C. stated he disallowed the items, £. for Gaelic scholarship and £1 6s 3d for the tricolour. However worthy the expenditure, he could not certify them. The chairman said the surcharge for the Irish scholarship to the Pois last year was very inconsistent on the Government's part. It was decided to appeal in the two matters.

Tullamore Claims.—Tullamore R.D.C. had a very large number of claims before them at their last meeting, under Criminal Injury Acts. Among the claimants were:—John Kilmartin, Derrydooney, £300, straw, hay, shed, etc., destroyed; Mary Killian, Connaught street, Athlone, £25; leather goods destroyed at Clara on March 30, 1922, after being removed from train; John Bergin, Coole, Cloonastee, £300 for dwelling house destroyed.

Dundalk Harbour Commissioners.—Dundalk Harbour Commissioners yesterday placed an order with Messrs. Gwynna, London, for a tug to cost £4,750. An order for suction plant was placed with the same firm who had arranged with a Belfast firm for the erecting of a pontoon. To this the Commissioners objected and, on their recommendation this work was entrusted to a Dublin firm.

Athlone Milk War.—In pursuance of a resolution passed by the Athlone Trades Council, the workers in Athlone refused to pay more than 4d per quart for milk from May 1st. The vendors in many cases refused to supply milk at less than 6d and 7d per quart—the old price—and brought it home. The workers are using condensed milk as an alternative, and strongly protest against the attitude of the vendors.

Dundalk Claims.—Claims lodged with the Dundalk Rural Council, which ordered the solicitor to defend same, include, William Barbour, Lisburn, £113 thread burned; Boyne Weaving Co., Drogheda, £287, linen and cotton; W. and G. Baird, Belfast, £150 printed goods; Thomas Glover, Manchester, £75, gas meters; Thomas Archer, Dublin, damage to property at Ravensdale. Dozens of smaller claims were received for burnings at Castlebellingham, Inniskeen and Dundalk stations.

ULSTER.

Dear Pork.—Pork rose £1 per cwt. at Strabane yesterday, when it sold at 140/- per cwt.

Strabane Rates Down.—Strabane Urban Council have struck a rate of 11/5 in the £, a reduction of 3/- on last year.

Irrecoverable Rates.—The Clerk reported to Cookstown Urban Council that the total irrecoverable rates only amounted to £9 10/-. This was considered very satisfactory.

Death from Fall Off Bicycle.—John McIlree, a railway worker, belonging to Kellswater, died in the Ballymena District Hospital on Monday from injuries received through falling off his bicycle on Saturday.

The Recent Heavy Frosts.—Owing to the severity of the recent frosts it has been found

necessary in many districts of Tyrone, Armagh and neighbouring counties to re-sow oats, the first sowing having been killed.

Cookstown Co-opted.—At the monthly meeting of the Cookstown Urban Council on Monday night, Mr. R. H. Twigg, solicitor, was co-opted in room of Mr. Thomas J. Crawford, deceased, on the motion of Mr. J. Bell, seconded by Mr. S. McKinney.

Burglary Near Ballybay.—The Doobhamlet (Co. Monaghan) Central Co-operative Stores were burglariously entered on 30th April, and a large number of pairs of shoes and boots and other valuable goods taken. The local I.R.A. are investigating the affair.

Malicious Injury Claims.—At Ballymena Urban Council Mr. James Clarke, solicitor, on behalf of the Ballymena Cricket Club, lodged an application for compensation for criminal injury amounting to £12 for the malicious destruction of windows, books, a stove, etc., in the pavilion.

Dunboe Co-operative Society.—At the annual meeting of the Dunboe (Co. Antrim) Co-operative Poultry Society (Dr. Steele, J.P., presiding), it was announced that the turnover for the year was £27,800 9s 10d, the gross profit £5,317 19s 6d, the expenses £3,182 2s 10d, the net profit £135 9s 10d, as against £640 17s 3d the previous year. The decrease in profits was attributed to increased expenses and decreased turnover. It was intimated that prizes would be given to the three largest suppliers of eggs during this year.

MUNSTER.

Agrarian Dispute Settled.—A dispute between the Knight of Glin and graziers on his property has been settled by the I.R.A.

Bacon Factory Raided.—The premises of the Roscrea Co-operative Bacon Factory were entered and about £200 taken on Tuesday night.

Custom House Raided.—The Dungarvan Custom House was raided on Tuesday by armed men, who made a thorough search of the premises.

Motor Car Taken.—The motor car belonging to Mr. M. J. Casey, Dungarvan, was taken from his garage a few nights ago. No trace of it has been discovered.

Railway Travellers Suspended.—All traffic on West and South Clare Railways was completely suspended yesterday owing to trouble about apprentices in workshops.

Arrests for Cattle-Driving.—Six persons have been arrested by Ennis Volunteer police for cattle-driving in Corofin district, and removed to Limerick goal.

Series of Motor Seizures.—Motor cars were taken a few nights ago from Mr. L. R. Carey, Manager, Munster and Leinster Bank, Drumcollogher; Dr. Hannigan, Drumcollogher; and from Mr. Moses Hannigan, Drumcollogher.

Raid on Racing Stables.—Six horses, bridles, and saddles were taken a few nights ago from the stables of Mr. Nigel Baring, Rockbarton, Bruff. They have not since been returned. It is stated that Mr. Baring is leaving the district to reside in England.

Special Court at Doneraile.—At a special parish court at Doneraile, James Allen, alias James Haycroft, was returned for trial to Kanturk District Court on the charge of breaking into the dwellinghouse of Margaret Whiteside Sycamore, Doneraile, on 12th April, and assaulting her.

Farmer Seriously Wounded.—A farmer in Kiltcealy named McCarthy, finding cattle trespassing on his land some days ago, was proceeding to remove them, when he was fired on and assaulted by two men. His injuries are so serious that he now lies in a critical condition.

Funeral of Mr. James P. Woulfe.—The funeral of Mr. James P. Woulfe, Cratloe, Abbeyfeale, who is much regretted in West Limerick and Kerry, took place at Abberfeale, Chief mourners:—Rev. P. Woulfe, C.C., Kilmallock (who presided at the obsequies, assisted by twelve other priests from outside districts); Dr. T. Woulfe, M.B., Tarbert; M. J. Woulfe, Knockeen House, Castleisland; John and James Woulfe, Cratloe (sons).

CONNACHT.

Mails Robbed.—For the third time since Christmas the mail car between Ballinasloe and Banagher was held up on Monday morning near Laurencetown by armed men, the parcels were torn open, and all articles of value and registered letters carried away.

Encouraging Irish.—The Roscommon Co. Committee, on the motion of Rev. Father Keane, have arranged for continuation classes in the county for the teaching of Irish, and also promised a subscription of £50 (if funds are available) towards the expenses of the Rathcroghan Pois.
