The annual macting of the Cork Opera. House Company was held yesterday in the green room of the theatre. Mr M D DALY prosided.

MR. GLADSTONE ON ARCHAIC GREECE.

"A SCHOLAR AMONG SCHOLARS."

At the Oriental Congress in Landon yestershow Professor Max Muller read a paper on Archaic. Greece and the East, written by Mr Gladstone, who is President of the section for Archaic Grocce and the East. The Professor expressed regret at the absence of the Prime Minister. whom he described as "a scholar among scholars." The paper shewed that the old civilizations telerably known to us were these which appeared to have sprung up with murvellous rapidity in the Babylonian plain and Valley of the Nile. With one or both of these was associated a navigating and building rac-, which kept open the line of traffic between them and Greece. With regard to the que tion of kingship, Homer, although he havailed himself of the venerable character accorded to bearers of civil authority, the basis of which he always regarded as divine, he was never led into the region of despotic ideas. Mr Gladstone suggested that the little "anaxandron" which occurs in Homer's poems was of Egyptian origin.
