Prosecutor Swanson refused to discuss the reopening of the often threat-ened city hall investigation, but it was ened city hall investigation, but it was generally understood at the Criminal Courts building that each city hall department was to be investigated for overloaded pay rolls and possible violations of the civil service law by the employment of 60 day appointes.

The prosecutors would not disclose whether the move was intended to keep a watch over the funds being turned over by the Strawn rescue committee to help the city out of its financial difficulties. "The state's attorney can see all the records of my department," said Wolfe when he was served with the subpoena notice by Detective Daniel Madigan. "We have nothing to conceal.

"I, however, can see nothing but politics behind this move. I believe I have made a good record and it is an important question for the taxpayers as to whether that record payers as
