

Hamilton Plans To Give 9 Talks In New England

G. O. P. Chairman to Open Week's Tour Tuesday in Augusta Me.

Boston, July 11.—Chairman John Hamilton of the Republican National Committee will tour the six New England States this week to confer with party workers. His schedule, announced tonight, calls for nine addresses in seven cities during four days.

Accompanying him will be Representative Joseph Martin, of Massachusetts, national committeeman and Eastern divisional director of the Republican Presidential campaign.

Hamilton will open his conferences with party workers in Maine. He will go to Augusta Tuesday to discuss the State organization. That evening he will speak at Bangor, Me., at a rally.

To Go to Concord.

The following day Hamilton will meet party leaders at the home of National Committeewoman Esther Toland, of Concord, N. H., and then will address State leaders and party workers at the Concord Auditorium.

Late Wednesday Hamilton will motor to Montpelier, Vt., for a dinner with Granite State party officials, followed by a public meeting at City Hall at 8:30 p. m.

Connecticut and Rhode Island are on the schedule Thursday. Hamilton's plans call for an address to 600 or 700 Connecticut party leaders meeting at the estate of State Chairman J. Henry Roraback near Hartford, Conn., Thursday noon.

Will Talk at Providence.

Thursday night Hamilton will address a gathering of party workers at the Victory Theater, Providence.

He will complete his New England tour with addresses at Boston Friday. At noon he will speak to a luncheon of Republican newspaper editors of the State, and at 6:30 p. m. will address city, town and ward committees. George F. Booth, Worcester publisher, will be host at the editors' meeting.

Lemke Names Aid.

Chicago, July 11 (AP).—Richard W. Wolfe, of Chicago, was named today as the national treasurer of the new Union Party, which Representative William Lemke (Republican), North Dakota, will lead into the fall Presidential race.

Wolfe held the same office in the third party campaign made by Robert "Bob" La Follette, Wisconsin Progressive, in 1924. His selection was announced by Lemke, here to set up the Union Party's headquarters.

Lemke said the Union Party's fall drive would be financed through the sale of "charter membership certificates" to all who contribute \$1 or more.

"Lemke to Win"—Coughlin.

St. Paul, July 11 (AP).—The Rev. Father Charles E. Coughlin, Detroit radio priest, predicted in an interview today that Congressman William Lemke, of North Dakota, Union Party candidate, will be the next President of the United States and John Garner, Vice President.

Father Coughlin came here "to feel the State's political pulse" and to confer with State officials of his National Union for Social Justice.

Six States Balance Budgets.

Phoenix, Ariz., July 11 (AP).—Gov. Dave Sholtz of Florida said in an interview with the Phoenix Gazette today that Democratic Governors of six States have either balanced their budgets or maneuvered their States into favorable positions financially "and not one of them is a candidate for President."

"All of these Governors have done a better job than Landon of Kansas," Sholtz said, referring to the "budget-balancing" record of the Republican Presidential nominee.

He said the Democratic Governors who have made better records are R. B. Moeur, Arizona; Clyde L. Herring Iowa; R. L. Cochran, Nebraska; Edwin C. Johnston, Colorado; Leslie A. Miller, Wyoming, and himself.

Move to Draft Norris.

McCook, Nebr., July 11 (AP).—George W. Norris, Nebraska's veteran Senator, quietly observed his seventy-fifth birthday today at his Wisconsin summer home without answering the question whether he would run for a fifth term in the United States Senate.

A bipartisan committee of volunteers is circulating petitions to "draft" Norris for another term. President Roosevelt and the Nebraska State Democratic convention both have urged him to seek reelection.

If he enters the campaign three candidates will be in the race at the November 3 election. Terry Carpenter, former Congressman from Scotts Bluff, won the Democratic nomination in the April primary. Robert G. Simmons, Lincoln attorney, who once represented the western Nebraska district in Congress, is the Republican nominee.

Marvin Runs for Governor.

Syracuse, N. Y., July 11 (AP).—Mayor Rolland B. Marvin broke an enigmatic silence of several months today and announced himself a candidate for the Republican nomination for Governor.

The entrance of the Syracuse mayor into the pre-convention picture creates a situation in which two leading up-State Republicans from the same city are thrown into the spotlight as Republican nominee possibilities for Governor.

The other is Senator George R. Fearon, who prior to the National Convention announced he would accept the nomination if it were offered to him.

Rep. Brown in Senate Race.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., July 11 (AP).—Representative Prentiss M. Brown, of St. Ignace, announced today he would seek the Democratic nomination for senator in the primary election in September.

Like Frank Murphy, Philippine high commissioner who announced his candidacy for the governorship

of Michigan a few days ago, Brown is understood to have yielded to pressure from President Roosevelt's campaign managers to enter the senatorial race.

In his statement, Brown said, "I have been a reasonably consistent supporter of the President's policies and shall continue to be. I accept his leadership; I accept the platform adopted at Philadelphia last June as the chart of the course we propose to follow."

Senator James Couzens, whose term expires this year, is a close personal friend of Representative Brown. He already has announced his candidacy for renomination on the Republican ticket.

One Rival for Borah.

Boise, Idaho, July 11 (AP).—Senator William E. Borah's opposition in the Republican primary diminished to one opponent today.

A few hours before the deadline for recording nominating petitions, R. E. Whitten, of Grimes Pass, veteran Republican State legislator, withdrew from the race.

This left Byron Defenbach, former Republican State auditor—endorsed by the Townsend organization—as Borah's opposition in the Idaho primary.

The opponents of Gov. C. Ben Ross for the Democratic Senatorial nomination increased to two when John A. Carver of Pocatello announced he would enter the race.

Leslie Aker, Boise attorney, had announced previously.
